

## A Word From Susie Stanley

As some of you already know, the Rev. Dr. Janet Peifer died in her sleep November 13, 2004. Cause of death was a rare heart problem that could not have been diagnosed prior to her death. We decided to include my tribute at Janet's funeral in this newsletter as a testimony to her ministry in WHWC. The family requested that women who have been influenced by Janet's ministry sit together at the funeral. Approximately forty women provided a visual witness to the fruits of Janet's labors. A representative of the Brethren in Christ listed many of the activities she had undertaken within the denomination that promoted women in ministry. Janet's passion came through loud and clear.

Others are continuing Janet's work within the Brethren in Christ. Over sixty contributions have been made to the memorial fund dedicated to The Brethren in Christ Council on Women in Ministry and Leadership which she founded. ## Book Review

Smythe Shannon, and Rob Wall. *Women With a Passion for Ministry: Catechism*. Seattle: WA: Seattle Pacific University, 2004.

This 34-page booklet addresses theological and biblical foundations in support of the ministry of gifted and called women in church leadership. Adopting a catechetical format, the authors provide information followed by biblical readings, discussion questions and questions for reflection. Paragraphs about prominent women throughout church history are sprinkled throughout the booklet.

A student authored the section entitled "One Woman's Testimony." She spoke of attending the 2002 "Come to the Water" conference where a sermon by the Rev. Linda Adams on jars of clay encouraged her in her calling to pastoral ministry. We will never know the extent of God's work during these conferences!

## Good Things are Happening

This past summer, the Church of the Nazarene conducted nine conferences across the North American continent for Pastors and Leaders. Wanting women clergy to attend and participate, WHWC board member, Vicki Copp arranged with representative women clergy from each of the nine educational regions to present workshops and the WHWC display. The result of this summer-long event was encouraging. Deborah Bell, associate at College Church in Kankakee said, "I believe there has been a major paradigm shift in the Church of the Nazarene regarding women clergy..." Jeanne Serrao, a New Testament professor at Mount Vernon Nazarene University, was pleased with the turnout there. "We had some great discussion and I personally was excited to meet so many more of the women clergy on our educational region and begin to develop some relationships." Dee Boyt, pastor of Winsboro First in Louisiana, reported that one of the most exciting things was an impromptu ladies prayer and share time in the dorm which lasted until almost 2 am. According to Carol Rotz of Northwest Nazarene University, many of the participants plan to keep in contact with one another for sharing, mentoring and encouragement. Rev. Rondy Smith reports that several action items came out of the gathering of women clergy in Tennessee. Rev. Jayne Taylor observed that thirteen percent of the conference participants in Canada were women. General Superintendent Dr. Jim Bond attended one of the Point Loma Nazarene University sessions to actively listen and to ask questions. At the General Assembly for the Church

of the Nazarene in June 2005 a follow-up workshop will be facilitated by Rev. Nancy Clayton and a breakfast for clergywomen is being planned.

# Funeral Tribute for Janet Peifer

Come to the Water. This has been the name for the conferences sponsored by WHWC. It was this organization that first brought Janet and me together. She helped facilitate Brethren in Christ denominational support for the conferences. Then, she served on the Planning Board. She was every board chair's dream. If she said she would do something, she did it. Janet was 100% dependable, 100% supportive. She shared the commitment of the group to encourage women in ministry and educate our churches in their role in placing them in pulpits.

Janet and I soon learned that we shared a deep passion for the utilization of women's gifts for ministry. We spoke the same language. There was no need for explanations. She became one of my best friends. After her board term was up, I asked her to remain on the board, creating a new position of assistant convener. In this capacity, Janet played an increasing role in WHWC. She was my right hand woman. She became my confidant. I didn't always feel like coming to the water. There have been times of discouragement and downright disgust at some of the actions of people who would thwart women's calling to ministry. We shared each other's pain, prayed and continued the journey, knowing that God had called us to this task. Janet's commitment even in the face of setbacks was unwavering.

Janet helped handle some of the hard responsibilities for the conference. For example, she had served as trouble shooter for the registration process. You can imagine that with 559 registrations at the 2004 conference, there would be some room for confusion or misunderstanding. I had full confidence in her ability to deal with any issues that arose and she didn't disappoint me. She also helped me deal with hirings and firings, never an easy task. I relied on her wisdom as we make some hard decisions.

It was Janet who I called when our registrations stood at 170 just 1 1/2 months before one conference. We agonized over the discrepancy between this number and our goal of 500. We were both extremely careful with our money. We cut back on the budget, being realistic about our situation while at the same time, we still decided to print 550 programs just in case everyone came. They did.

It was just 1 week ago [Nov. 4-7, 2004] that the planning board met to organize the next conference. Janet offered to supervise the making of a quilt at the Messiah Village which would represent the theme of the conference. She offered to lead a workshop on ministering to older adults. Her name is sprinkled throughout the minutes. Janet had edited the newsletter for several years. She countersigned checks, dealing with our \$300,000 budget. Who's going to fill her shoes?

Janet's influence spread throughout the country because of her significant involvement in WHWC. Once the word of her death started spreading, I began receiving e-mails from around the country. Janet was well known and her gifts were appreciated. Here are excerpts from a few.

- a Free Methodist leader who just met Janet – "words can't express the emotion I feel... she was a very good leader"

- "We all will miss Janet very much. For years to come, we will celebrate her contribution to WHWC." – the leader of Nazarene World Missions.

Messages have come from a Quaker in Oregon, a Salvation Army officer in Alexandria, VA, and I'm sure that's just the beginning.

Janet had so many dreams yet to be realized. I often talk with my students about the fact that sometimes there are no easy answers to the huge question—Why? We just have to know that God is with us in our questions. Last summer, Janet and I sat in her back yard with Lake Meade lapping at the deck. She shared her hopes for the next several years. There is a Women in Ministry room at Messiah College. In anticipating the future growth of the Brethren in Christ Council on Women in Ministry and Leadership, the room was designated as its office. Speaking of this room, I'm reminded of one of the most fun times we had together. Her schedule, as usual, was extremely busy but she carved out 1 1/2 hours to shop for furniture for this room. We had more fun picking out chairs and a table. But even with the excitement of having funding for this furniture, Janet decided to make lined drapes for the room to add to its specialness. As is often the case with projects, she ran into difficulties and the night before the open house, she and Elvin were still working on getting them hung correctly.

Now, she isn't here to fulfill those dreams. I can't even imagine going forward without her. But that doesn't mean that her dreams are dead. I firmly believe that God right now is calling up others to transform those dreams into reality. My prayer is that several of you will capture Janet's dreams and do the work necessary to make them a reality. Women, or men, you can honor her ministry by answering God's calling to continue her work. We don't know why Janet was taken now, at the very time when her work was bearing so much fruit. But, we can respond to the call to bring in the harvest.

Since the beginning, our conferences have visibly recognized the cloud of witnesses who have gone before us in ministry. Pictures of women in ministry are attached to the walls surrounding our worship space. Janet has joined our Cloud of Witnesses to remind "us to run with perseverance the race marked out for us."

Jesus promised the Samaritan woman: "those who drink the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life." Janet is drinking that water today. We celebrate her time on earth and her vision for women in ministry. I thank God for the privilege I had to be a co-worker with this marvelous woman. †
